Thank you James for responding. Yes, this has caused quite a dispute/ legal issue as the tree is (was) clearly on our property. To grant removal of this tree simply to appease the owners of 122 Wagner Avenue has caused a dispute and has disregarded our rights as dual owners of this tree. And on the subject of the rock wall, that is our property behind the fence. I am assuming that this removal was also approved without the review of land surveys? After speaking with their contractor, they plan to plant trees where the rock wall now stands, thus on our property, which I'm sure was a large reason to remove that tree. For background, the owners had to sign a legal document when they purchased their home, which Mara Souther confirmed with me in a past discussion, that forbids them from altering or using any portion of this land behind our fence. Can you confirm that the rock wall removal was in fact approved without survey review?

Also, please confirm the VOM's law regarding how close to a neighbors property line trees can be planted.

Good Morning Ms. Caldwell,

I apologize for not getting back to you yesterday but we have been busy working on pedestrian safety issues out in the field and other DPW tasks.

An application for removal was submitted by the owner of 122 Wagner Avenue. I reviewed the application and visited the site, as well as spoke with a male party that represented himself as the owner(he did come out from inside the house when I rang the bell).

The removal application has a section for adjacent/affected parties for the applicant to disclose. This section was left blank and during our discussion on site, the male mentioned several times leveling the yard and removing the rock walls and adjusting the landscape for the safety of his child. All of which started with removing the tree. Through the entire process the owner

represented as having ownership of the tree. The Village GIS also shows the property line being on the "123 Carroll avenue" side of the tree, further making his case believable. Surveys are not a requirement of the application process.

The removal was granted based on the proximity to the shed, rear of house and the root system of the tree being partially exposed with no room to expand on the house side due to a drop in grade and a wall. These items created a risk factor and target area that the owner of 122 Wagner was not willing to accept.

I apologize for the discrepancy this has caused over ownership and removal of the tree, however, at this time this is a neighbor/property dispute issue. There is not much DPW can do about this.

Hello James and Members of the Tree Committee -

I am reaching out in regards to a tree removal permit that was approved for 122 Wagner Avenue, Mamaroneck. The tree that was cut down was also on our property, 123 Carroll Avenue, Mamaroneck. The owners, Mara and Chris Souther never contacted us for consent to remove the tree or gave us any notice that the tree was being taken down. The tree was healthy, with no disease or falling branches. It provided all of the shade in our yard. Our fence was also boxed around the tree, and now the boxed area of our fence needs to be removed and rebuilt. I will also point out that our fence is within our property line.

Can you please tell my your process for approving these permit requests? Did anyone come look at this tree to confirm that it indeed 100% belonged to the permit applicants? As you can see from the attached photo, it clearly is on our property as well. To legally obtain a Village of Mamaroneck tree removal permit, they should have obtained our permission and signature for the application to approve this tree removal as the application clearly states, "for activities that include proposed removal of tree(s) that straddle a property line, the signature from the adjacent/affected property owner acknowledging the application for tree removal(s) shall be included below."

We did contact the owners immediately when we saw the tree being taken down and they refused to stop.

Attachment 3 Planting Beyond the Right of Way

Hello all,

Apologies, I missed this email thread until just now, when I'm beginning the agenda for Wednesday's meeting.

The Tree Law, 318-7 E, allows the planting of Village trees on private property when it will serve our purposes and provide the benefits of trees that would not otherwise be available:

The Board of Trustees may authorize the planting of a tree on private property at the expense of the Village upon obtaining the consent of the property owner and determining that the planting of the tree will serve the purposes and provide the benefits of trees identified in this chapter. The property owner must execute an agreement, acceptable in form to the Village Attorney, acknowledging that the tree, once planted, is the responsibility of the property owner.

This section, which is supported by NYS case law, was included because the Village has many streets and neighborhood without right of way space to accommodates mature trees; private property is the only space available.

When the Tree Committee recommends these BROW (Beyond the Right Of Way) locations, we consider all the benefits included in the Purpose of the Tree Law, among them heat mitigation, pollution reduction, flood water mitigation, and erosion control, among others. We're also cognizant how low the VOM canopy cover (about 24%) is compared to the 40% scientists say is needed to receive full benefits from the combination of public and private trees.

We are very conscious of the risk of landscaping for private property owners and try to avoid that abuse. We have recommended very few trees for BROW planting since the new law went into effect. In some neighborhoods with almost no cover, however, frequently those with lower income residents, we wish more property owners would accept the offer of trees.


Committee members would be responsible for maintaining the form and managing the responses.

Attachment 5 Bird Sanctuary Maintenance

Hi Jeff,

Leslie Lam (Tree Committee) and I were recently in conversation with Marc Radulovic, who lives on Shore Acres Drive across from the Bird Sanctuary.

He expressed some of the frustrations we often hear from residents on that street about the conditions there. Leslie and I repeated the point that it's a bird sanctuary, not a park, but we did agree that some of the issues could be addressed to the benefit of both residents and wildlife. Here are our thoughts and recommendations:

- Invasive vines are choking and killing trees. An effective and fast solution would be cutting the vines near ground level, rather than the perfect solution of digging them out. This is a huge job and it would demand an enormous (and probably not possible) amount of time for your staff. As an alternative, I think we could muster a volunteer corps next fall to take it on, if you would consider that possibility.
- Mowing and maintaining a 6' shoulder from the start of Shore Acres Drive at The Parkway to the South Barry intersection (stopping at the private property on the corner) would improve both the appearance and pedestrian safety and visibility of the sanctuary. Currently there's a shoulder along some portions but it's uneven and occasionally disappears altogether.
- Digging out the invasive plants such as mugwort in the shoulder would benefit everyone. I'm thinking it would be good to replace them with a native sedge that would have deep roots to stabilize the soil, reduce erosion, and absorb some of the excess rainfall (this street is prone to flooding). Many sedges spread and would fill in after planting, so the invasives would have a harder time re-establishing. Sedges can be walked on and, if necessary, mown.

Thanks for considering these ideas. We'd appreciate a chance to talk about them.

Beverley
